WHAT HAPPENS IF YOUR BABY HAS NAS/NOWS?

In Ohio, a baby who has a confirmed diagnosis of Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome (NAS) or Neonatal Opioid Withdrawal Syndrome (NOWS) is automatically eligible for Early Intervention.

Early Intervention supports families with children birth to age 3 who have NAS/NOWS so they have the best possible start in life. Early Intervention professionals support your family to identify strengths and needs and address concerns as early as possible, with services right where you live, play, and spend your day.

WHAT SHOULD YOU DO NEXT?

If your baby has been diagnosed with NAS/NOWS, you or your healthcare provider can refer to Early Intervention right away. The process is simple.
